Chiara Baffa studied English, North American and Spanish Literature in Florence and Barcelona. Paula Clarke Bain is a Fellow of the Society of Indexers (SI), the first new SI Fellow in over 10 years. She is also an Advanced Professional Member of the Chartered Institute of Editing and Proofreading (CIEP), and has been a full-time editorial freelancer for 20 years. She particularly relishes the synergic, friendly, and often fun experience of working with authors directly. She has enjoyed getting involved in various SI matters, including being co-creator of National Indexing Day (#indexday), past SI Marketing Director, and writing for *The Indexer* journal. Dr Kiene Brillenburg Wurth is professor of Literature and Comparative Media at Utrecht University, with an interdisciplinary focus in Comparative Literature. She was trained in literature and film at the MA level (cum laude), as well as in literature, music, and music philosophy at the PhD level (cum laude). She has since developed research lines in literature, (new) media, and creative thinking, publishing peer-reviewed books, edited books, special issues in journals, book chapters, and journal articles. She was Head of Humanities at University College Utrecht from 2017 to 2020, director of graduate studies for the Department of

Languages, Literature, and Communication from 2013 to 2017, and from 2011 to 2016 she was project leader of the NWO-funded VIDI research project Back to the Book, and visiting scholar at Harvard University in 2010–11. She has worked in Utrecht since 2001, having previously taught at Groningen University and the Free University of Amsterdam. Kiene is a member of the Utrecht School for medical humanities and co-founder of the interdisciplinary platform UPCE, which seeks to empower creativity in primary, secondary, and higher education. She has been a member of the research committee on Literature, Arts and Media (CLAM) of the International Comparative Literature Association since 2018, and a member of the editorial board of the *Journal for Possibility Studies* (Wiley) since 2022.



Glenda Browne has been a freelance indexer of books, journals and websites since 1988. She is co-author of *Website indexing* and *The indexing companion* (her index to which was Highly Commended in the ANZSI Indexing Medal awards), and author of *The indexing companion workbook: book indexing*. Glenda was the winner of the 2007 Ig Nobel Prize for Literature for an article about indexing the definite article in *The Indexer*. Glenda has been ANZSI president, education officer, newsletter editor and representative on the IDPF EPUB Indexes Working Group. She has taught short courses in indexing for



Kate Mertes is sole proprietor of Mertes Editorial Services, providing indexing, information retrieval, and editorial expertise for complex, challenging projects in law and the humanities. Kate took her BA in medieval studies, a PhD in medieval history, and a post-doctoral degree in theology, and after teaching at university level for several years moved into publishing, starting her own indexing and editorial services business in 1998. Kate served on the Board of the American Society for Indexing (ASI), has been ASI president, and was conference chair 2013–16. She is also a founding member of the Institute of Certified Indexers. She has written numerous books and articles on medieval history and indexing. She has twice won ASI's Award for Excellence in Indexing (2013 and 2015) and received the Theodore C. Hines Award for services to indexing in 2014.



Martin Müller is Ontology Manager for Springer Nature. He studied physics in Berlin and Groningen (The Netherlands) and obtained a PhD in Nuclear Solid State Physics from the Free University Berlin in 2001. He began his publishing career copy-editing for *Physica Status Solidi* at Wiley VCH Berlin in 2002 and later that year joined Springer as Scientific Editor in Darmstadt for Landolt-Börnstein, the encyclopedia on Physics, Chemistry and Materials Sciences. The transition from print to digital during the 2000s forced the transformation of printed handbook volumes into a web-based content management system – SpringerMaterials – and the focus on meta-information and meta-annotation

necessitated a change to required skill sets. In 2008 Martin joined the SpringerMaterials editorial team in Heidelberg as Development Editor for online products, building the SpringerMaterials thesaurus, managing the annotation process and the assignment of meta-information and meta-data to the digitised content. Following the Springer/ Nature merger in 2015 within the Holtzbrinck Publishing Group, Martin became Ontology Manager for the whole company (Springer Nature) in 2016. His role encompasses the building and coordination of a unified ontology as well as the classification and annotation of all published content. He combines human expertise from in-house subject matter experts (editorial) with machine-learning algorithms developed by Digital Science, a company which is also part of the Holtzbrinck Group.



Dr Katharina Munk is one of the three founders of Klarso GmbH and responsible for marketing, sales and product development. She initiated the product development of Index Manager (Idx) and leads its worldwide distribution and community support. Her focus is on enrichment and knowledge modelling of complex data with the help of indexing, thesauri and semantic knowledge networks.



Johannes Munk, Berlin, is one of the three founders of Klarso GmbH and leads the technology development. He studied computer science and physics at RWTH (Aachen) and KIT (Karlsruhe) and has 25 years of experience in software development.
